

## Relative Pronouns: Where

**FORM:**

**WHERE**

**USE:**

**WHERE** is frequently used to make questions about place and location, such as “*Where is the chocolate?*” However, **WHERE** can also be used as a relative pronoun to join two clauses together. It can be used in affirmative, negative and interrogative forms.

**EXAMPLES:**

*I met my fiancé in a restaurant. This is the restaurant.  
This is the restaurant where I met my fiancé.*

*I met my fiancé in a restaurant. This isn't the restaurant.  
This isn't the restaurant where I met my fiancé.*

*Is this the restaurant where you met your fiancé?*

**NOTE:**

**WHERE** can be replaced with **THAT**, however, you may need to add a preposition to make a correct sentence.

*This is the bedroom where I used to sleep.  
This is the bedroom that I used to sleep in.*

*Combine the two sentences together using WHERE as a relative pronoun.*

1. Celine Dion was born in the province of Quebec. This is the province of Quebec.  
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2. The telephone was invented in Canada. This is Canada.  
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3. Ottawa is the capital of Canada. The parliament buildings are in Ottawa.  
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4. Alberta and British Columbia are provinces of Canada. The Rocky Mountains are in Alberta and British Columbia.  
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
