

## Adverbial Clauses: Whenever

**USE:** The “**Simple Present tense**” is for habits. “**Whenever**” is only used for two habits that are logically done together. It is not the same as, “**when**”, which is not always a habit word. Sometimes “**when**” can be used when there are two actions in the sentence and one is after the other.

**EXAMPLES:** *My friends buy bagels for their uncle whenever they visit him. (Not: My friends buy bagels whenever it snows.)*  
*I take a shower when I get up. (Sometimes used for habits.)*  
*I took a shower when he called to invite me for dinner. (Two actions, one after the other.)*
