In conditional sentences, the order of the *if* clause and the main clause can be reversed. When the *if* clause goes first, it is separated from the main clause with a comma. Sometimes "*when*" is used instead of "*if*" in Zero Conditionals. When using the verb *be* in the Second Conditional, "were" is used with singular and plural subjects.
