## Conditionals: Third Conditional <br> If clause <br> if + past perfect <br> Main clause <br> would have + past participle <br> USE The Third Conditional is used to describe hypothetical or untrue events in the past. With this form we can speculate about past events and how past events could have affected other things. The order of the if clause and the main clause can be changed. When the if clause appears first, it is separated from the main clause by a comma. The auxiliary verbs are often contracted. <br> EXAMPLES If I had worn my seatbelt, I wouldn't have gotten a ticket. (I didn't wear my seatbelt.) <br> I would've been on time if I hadn't overslept in this morning. (I did oversleep.) <br> If they'd had more time, they would've spent another week in Mexico.
