Other Hypothetical Forms: Hypothetical and Actual Statements

It is possible to mix **hypothetical** (unreal or possible) **results** with **actual conditions**. "*Otherwise*" or "*but*" can be used to join hypothetical results with actual conditions. For hypothetical result in the past, use "*would*" or "*could*" + *have* + *past participle*. For present or future hypothetical results, use "*could*" or "*would*" + *base verb*.

Actual Condition

I was sick yesterday. Peter cleaned up his bedroom. It's going to rain.

Hypothetical Result

We <u>could go</u> out for dinner, I <u>would be</u> finished my report,

Hypothetical Result

Otherwise, I <u>could have attended</u> the meeting. Otherwise his mother <u>would have been</u> angry. Otherwise they <u>could paint</u> the house today.

Actual Condition

but I don't have enough money. but I watched a movie last night instead of doing it.

Give a hypothetical result for each actual condition below. Use BUT or OTHERWISE.

Example: I don't have a dog.

I don't have a dog. Otherwise, I would take long walks every day with my dog.

I'd take long walks every day if I had a dog, but I don't have one.
