Coordinating Conjunctions: Contrastive

Coordinating Conjunctions join words or phrases in a sentence that have a logical relationship. A **contrastive** conjunction indicates a difference between two similar elements. "**But**" is a common contrastive. "**Or**" indicates a contrastive meaning in affirmative sentences.

but *Toby listens to classical music, but not jazz.* (not both)

Linda likes bananas, <u>but</u> not mangoes. (not both)

Linda likes fruit, but Terry doesn't. (Only Linda likes fruit, not both of them.)

or Would you like coffee <u>or</u> tea? (not both)

He lives in Mississauga or Burlington. (not both, I can't remember which city)

I'll have pie or cake for dessert. (not both)
