Quantifiers: Negative

FORM:

Negative quantifiers tell us that the number or amount of something is insufficient. Negative quantifiers already have a negative meaning, so we do not make negative sentences with them. We also do not make questions with them. Some of the quantifiers go with count nouns, some go with non-count nouns and some go with both. They are listed below.

Count Nouns

Not all/not every
Not many
Few
Hardly any
Almost no/none
No/none/not any

Non-Count Nouns

not all
not much
little
hardly any
almost no/none
no/none/not any

Examples:

<u>Not all</u> Canadians speak English. There is <u>hardly any</u> candy left in the jar. There **isn't any** milk in the fridge.
