USE:		This form is used to demonstrate that two things are equal in terms of the adjective or adverb being used to compare them. That is, if you want to compare A: to B:, you can say that "A is as long as B". "Just" (meaning "exactly") and "nearly" or "almost" are common modifiers that can be used before "as".
