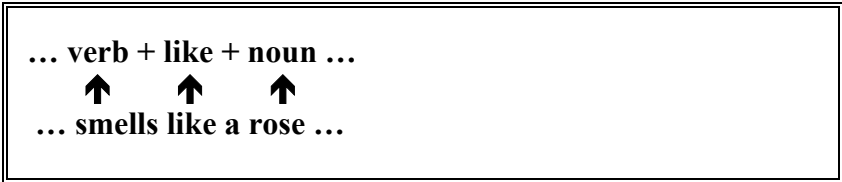


# Comparatives and Superlatives: Similes with Like

**FORM:**



**USE:**

A **simile** gives a more vivid description of a person, place or thing by comparing it to another familiar noun using “**like**”. Some common traditional comparisons:

<i>sing(s) like a bird</i>	<i>smell(s) like a rose</i>
<i>work(s) like a dog</i>	<i>run(s) like a deer</i>
<i>eat(s) like a pig</i>	<i>fly(ies) like an eagle</i>
<i>eat(s) like a horse</i>	<i>live(s) like a king</i>
<i>look(s) like an angel</i>	<i>swim(s) like a fish</i>
<i>lie(s) like a rug</i>	<i>grow(s) like a weed</i>
<i>beat(s) like a drum</i>	<i>work(s) like a charm</i>
<i>Smoke(s) like a chimney</i>	<i>drink(s) like a fish</i>
