Modals: In Passive Form FORM Passive modal + be + past participle **Past Passive** modal + have been + past participle **USE Modals in the passive form** can be formed in the affirmative, negative or interrogative. Modals of advice, possibility and necessity can all be used. (will, can, should, may, had better, have to, must, ought to, be supposed to) As with other passives, modals are used in the passive voice to emphasize the recipient of the action in a sentence, rather than the agent or 'doer' of the action. **EXAMPLES** The dinosaurs <u>may have been destroyed</u> by a huge natural disaster. This bill has to be paid by Friday. *Her apartment <u>must not have been painted</u> recently. (negative)* Can these pants be returned? (interrogative)
