Passive Voice: Verbs Not Used in the Passive

Transitive verbs (such as *buy, love,* or *give*) always take objects. It is incorrect, for example, to say "*I bought yesterday*." because necessary information, the object, is missing. "*I bought the ticket yesterday*." would be correct. **TRANSITIVE VERBS ARE USED IN THE PASSIVE.**

Intransitive verbs (such as *swim, happen,* or *sleep*) never take objects. **INTRANSITIVE VERBS ARE NOT USED IN THE PASSIVE.**

<u>Be careful</u>: Some verbs have both a **transitive** and **intransitive** form. For example, "work". *He worked the crowd* (Transitive). *The oven doesn't work* (Intransitive). They can be used in the passive only in their transitive use.

Linking verbs (such as *be, feel, become*) take a complement. **LINKING VERBS ARE NOT USED IN THE PASSIVE.**

The following verbs are often confused because of similar spellings and meanings, but they are grammatically different. Some are **transitive**, others are **intransitive**.

Intransitive: lie, lay, lain	to recline in a horizontal position The cat is lying on the bed.
<u>Transitive:</u> lay, laid, laid + OBJECT	to place something down The mother laid the baby on the bed.
Intransitive: rise, rose, risen	to come up The sun rises in the east.
Transitive: raise, raised, raised + OBJECT	to put something up Raise your hand if you have any questions.
Intransitive: sit, sat, sat	to assume a resting position, such as on a chair John always sits in the back of the room.
<u>Transitive:</u> set, set + OBJECT	to place or put something in a desired position <i>She set the alarm to ring at six o'clock.</i>

Make PASSIVE sentences with the following words if possible. If not, make an ACTIVE sentence. Be careful, some verbs are TRANSITIVE and INTRANSITIVE or TRANSITIVE and LINKING. If that is the case, use the TRANSITIVE form to make a passive sentence.
