The verbs below can take either the **gerund** or the **infinitive** as the object.

prefer propose start

I preferred <u>meeting</u> them on Wednesday. ∧ I preferred <u>to meet</u> them on Wednesday. ∧

BE CAREFUL: Some verbs change meaning **depending on** if an infinitive or a gerund follows them.

REGRET	We regret <u>to inform</u> you that the position has already been filled.	impersonal regret
	I regret stealing that money.	personal regret
TRY	We tried <u>to close</u> the window, but it was stuck.	effort
	If the room is cold, try <u>closing</u> the window or <u>turning</u> up the heat.	options
REMEMBER	Mark remembered <u>to mail</u> the letter.	something to do
	Mark remembers <u>meeting</u> her last week.	a memory
FORGET	Brigit forgot <u>to meet</u> him.	something not done
	Brigit will never forget <u>living</u> in China.	a memory
STOP	The man stopped <u>to smell</u> the roses.	interrupting one action to do another
