FORM:

my, your, her, his, its, our, your, their +"VERB-ing"

USE: The "possessive determiners + gerund" is an alternative to a number of constructions, especially **"that"** or **"if"** clauses.

Do you mind if I smoke? → Do you mind <u>my smoking</u>? He loved the fact that the staff remembered his birthday. → He loved <u>their</u> <u>remembering</u> his birthday.
