

Future: Present Tenses

SCHEDULES	SIMPLE PRESENT	<i>My plane arrives tonight at 5 P.M.</i>
	PRES. PROGRESSIVE	<i>My plane is arriving tonight at 5 P.M.</i>
	be going to + VERB	<i>My plane is going to arrive tonight at 5 P.M.</i>

When used with a future time marker (*tonight at 5 P.M.*), the simple present and the present progressive have a future meaning. They are often used to refer to a scheduled event or transportation timetables.

Examples:

The delegates have breakfast at seven o'clock tomorrow morning in the hotel restaurant.

The delegates are having breakfast at seven o'clock tomorrow morning in the hotel restaurant.

The delegates are going to have breakfast at seven o'clock tomorrow morning in the hotel restaurant.
