Conjunctions: Correlative

- 1. <u>BOTH...AND</u> is a structure that includes two ideas in a situation. If the structures are subject nouns, they take a plural verb.
- Ex. <u>Both</u> Ricky <u>and</u> his cousin **have to** clean up their rooms. <u>Both</u> Mary <u>and</u> Max **are** going to the concert
- 2. <u>EITHER...OR</u> is a structure that states only one of two nouns is included or considered in a situation. If the structure is managing two subject nouns, the noun closest to the verb influences whether the verb is singular or plural.
- Ex. <u>Either</u> my neighbours <u>or</u> Sally **is** going to have to clean up the litter on our lawn. <u>Either</u> Tom <u>or</u> his brothers **are** going to win the bet.
- 3. <u>NEITHER...NOR</u> is the negative counterpart of both...and. The subject that is closer to the verb determines whether the verb is singular or plural.
- Ex. <u>Neither</u> my sisters <u>nor</u> my mother **is** staying with me. <u>Neither</u> Rebecca <u>nor</u> her aunts **want** to participate in the contest.
- 4. <u>NOT (ONLY)...BUT (ALSO)</u> has two possibilities. When 'only' is present, it emphasizes that two situations or states are present. When 'only' and 'also' are absent, it emphasizes that one thing is true or present, but that the other is not. The subject that is closer to the verb determines whether the verb is singular or plural.
- Ex. Not only my sisters but also my father likes pasta.

 Not the chocolate ice cream but the vanilla ice cream is on sale.

 Not only my husband but also my children have blue eyes.
