Conditionals: Mixed

USE	To refer to both past and present in a conditional sentence, a different tense can be used in each clause. Usually, one clause is Second Conditional and one is Third Conditional.
EXAMPL	Past Action: I broke my camera. Present Result: I can't take any pictures today. If clause (3 rd Conditional) Main Clause (2 nd Conditional) If I hadn't broken my camera, I'd be able to take some pictures today.
	Present Fact: I am sick. If clause (2 nd Conditional) If I weren't so sick, Past Result: I wasn't able to visit you last week. Main Clause (3 rd Conditional) I would have visited you last week.
