FORM:	The present subjunctive is formed from the bare infinitive of a
	verb. This means there is no "to" in front of the verb.
	to be (infinitive) be (present subjunctive)
	to help (infinitive) help (present subjunctive)
	The past subjunctive is formed from the simple past.
	stood (simple past) stood (past subjunctive)
	ran (simple past) ran (past subjunctive)
	The verb "to be" is an exception to the rule for the past subjunctive .
	I/he/she/it can use either was or were. When the speaker wants to
	express doubt or uncertainty, were is more common than was.
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USE:	• The present subjunctive is used in some exclamations to express a wish or
	hope.
	God <u>help</u> us! Long <u>live</u> the king!
	• The present subjunctive can be used with certain verbs, nouns and adjectives
	followed by that (see Exercises 39 and 40).
	They ordered that we <u>evacuate</u> the ship.
	• The past subjunctive can be used after as if and as though to show doubt,
	unreality or improbability in the present.
	The politician spoke <u>as if</u> he <u>had won</u> the election! (He didn't win the
	election.)
	They act <u>as though</u> they <u>were</u> married. (They are not married.)
