Non-Finite Clauses: Infinitive Clauses

USE: The **Full Infinitive** (ex. to drive) is used:

- as the subject of another clause <u>To quit smoking</u> is the best alternative. /The best alternative is <u>to quit smoking</u>.
- as the complement of another clause *The best idea is to apply for a new job.*
- to add information to another clause *I went to Julia's wedding to congratulate her.*

Full infinitive clauses can generally come before or after the main clause. Perfect and passive infinitives can also be used.

It would have been dangerous <u>to have gone skiing in the snow storm</u>. The dog wants to be taken out for a long walk.

The **Bare Infinitive** (ex. drive) is used:

- following "rather than"

 <u>Rather than eat junk food</u>, John made himself a salad.
- as the complement in "Question word + information + be + highlighted information" structures
 What we should do is save \$100 every month.
- to add information to another clause that contains a "sense" verb (ex. see, hear)

 Paula didn't see anyone take the money from the table.

With "rather than", bare infinitive clauses can come before or after the main clause. Otherwise, the bare infinitive comes at the end.
