## **Simple Past: Negative Form**

FORM: All verbs except the verb "to be" use the auxiliary "do" (which changes to "did" in the past tense) followed by "not" to produce the negative.

<u>Subject + "do" (past) + not + simple form verb</u>

Note: The contraction "didn't" is more commonly used than "did not".AffirmativeNegativeContraction

	I went	I did not go	I didn't go			
	You went	You did not go	You didn't go			
	He went	She did not go	She didn't go			
	She went	He did not go	He didn't go			
	It went	It did not go	It didn't go			
	We went	We did not go	We didn't go			
	You went	You did not go	You didn't go			
	They went	They did not go	They didn't go			
EXAMPLES:	(Aff.): I <u>ea</u> t chocolate every day.					
	(Neg.) I do not eat chocolate every day.					

(Neg.) I <u>do not ea</u>t chocolate every day. (Neg./ Past Tense): I <u>did not ea</u>t chocolate every day.
