

Quantifiers: Much, Many

FORM: **MUCH MANY**

USE: “**Much**” and “**many**” are used before non-specific quantities of nouns.
“**Much**” is used with non-count nouns, that is, nouns that you cannot put a number in front of, such as money. For example, you can not say “five moneys”, so “money” is non-count.
“**Many**” is used with count nouns, that is, nouns you can put a number in front of, such as dollars. For example, “five dollars”.

EXAMPLES: *I have much money.*
 I have many plants.
