

Quantifiers: No, Not

FORM:

NO	NOT
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USE:

“**No**” is a quantity word of “zero” used before non-count and plural nouns or sometimes it must be placed before any adjectives which are describing those nouns. It’s the same as an **adjective** because it describes the noun.

“**Not**” is used to change the verb to negative. It is an **adverb**. Sometimes, **it’s used before quantity words like: much, many, once, twice, enough, etc. and acts like an adjective.**

Ex. (Aff.): *Many students came yesterday.*

(Neg.): *Many students didn’t come yesterday.*

Not many students came yesterday.

(Zero)(Aff): *No students came yesterday.*
