Relative Pronouns: Who/Which

FORM: Person + who

Thing + which

USE: Who and which are relative pronouns. They refer to a noun or pronoun which

comes before. They also join two clauses. (A clause is a subject + verb.)

Who refers to people. Which refers to things.

EXAMPLES: My friend, who is English, speaks several languages.

The table **which** broke was expensive.
