FORM:	FEW LITTLE
USE:	Both of these words describe a relatively small quantity of something. "Few" is used to describe a small quantity of something that <u>can</u> be counted. "Little" is used to describe a small quantity of something that <u>cannot</u> be counted.
EXAMPLES:	<u>Few</u> days go by as quickly as today has. <u>Little</u> time passed before she called us back.
