## **Quantifiers: Many, Much**

FORM:

**Before countable nouns:** many, quite a few, a lot of / lots of

**Before uncountable nouns:** much, a lot of / lots of

**USE:** 

**Countables:** 

Many:

"Many" is used for an inexact, but relatively large number of things. It is used with nouns that can be counted, such as dollars or cheques. It is often used in questions and negatives. It is also used in affirmative sentences, but less often in affirmatives with people as the subject

Quite a few: "Quite a few" is used to describe an inexact number that is

slightly larger than would be "normal".

A lot of / Lots of: These terms are used to describe a large but inexact quantity.

They have the same use and meaning.

**Uncountables:** 

Much:

Like many, "much" describes an inexact but relatively large quantity. It is used with nouns that cannot be counted, such as money or information. It is not normally used in affirmative sentences, but only in questions and negatives. You cannot

**say**, "This computer virus is giving us <u>much</u> trouble." You have to say, "This computer virus is giving us

a lot of trouble."

A lot of / Lots of: These terms have the same meaning and are used with countable and uncountable nouns.

**EXAMPLES:** 

There aren't many people at the stadium tonight.

There were quite a few here last night.

There will be a lot of people to see the Toronto Blue Jays game this weekend.

My neighbours don't have much interest in baseball.

This team has lots of talent.
