## Nouns: Somebody, Someone, Something, Anybody, Anything

FORM:

SOMEBODY SOMEONE SOMETHING ANYBODY ANYONE ANYTHING

**USE:** 

These words are singular. They cannot be pluralized. They represent a person or a thing which you cannot, or do not want to be specific about. "Somebody" and "anybody" are less formal than someone or anyone. "Some" is used in affirmative sentences. It is used in questions when you expect "yes" as an answer. It is therefore polite to use it when you offer someone something.

"Any" is used in other questions and in negatives.

**EXAMPLES:** Hello! Is <u>anybody</u> home?

Would you like <u>something</u> to drink?

<u>Someone</u> told me you're resigning. She didn't say <u>anything</u> about it to

me.
