## Conditionals: Zero, First, Second

FORM: Zero Conditional: Use the simple present tense in both clauses.
USE: Use this conditional to talk about general truths and scientific facts and to talk about habits and things that happen again and again.

EXAMPLES: If you eat vegetables, you stay healthy.
If you need help, call me.
FORM: First Conditional (Real): Use the simple present tense in the "if" clause and future tense in the main clause.

USE: Use this conditional to talk about what will happen under certain conditions.
EXAMPLES: If she wins the game, I'll be surprised.
If he passes his test, he's going to be happy.
FORM: Second Conditional (Unreal): use the simple past tense in the "if" clause and "would" or modals + a verb in the main clause.

USE: Use this conditional to talk about imaginary situations in the present. These situations are not true.

EXAMPLES: If I had time, I would go to the concert with you.
If I were thirsty, I would drink a glass of water.
