Adverbial Clauses: Whenever

USE: The "Simple Present tense" is for habits. "Whenever" is only used

for two habits that are logically done together. It is not the same as, "when", which is not always a habit word. Sometimes "when" can be used when there are two actions in the sentence and one is after

the other.

EXAMPLES: My friends <u>buy</u> bagels for their uncle <u>whenever</u> they <u>visit</u> him. (Not: My

friends buy bagels whenever it snows.)

I take a shower when I get up. (Sometimes used for habits.)

I took a shower when he called to invite me for dinner. (Two actions, one

after the other.)
