# Adverbial Clauses: Before, After, When , As soon As with the Present Tense 

FORM: These words can be used at the beginning or in the middle of the sentence and when used with Simple Present tense, introduce two habits that happen together.

USE: "Before" introduces an action which follows another. "After" introduces an action which precedes another. "When" is the same as "after", but it can also be used to introduce an action or situation which happens as a habit with another habit. "As soon as" introduces an action or situation which is immediately followed by another one.

EXAMPLES: I wash my hands before I eat. Before I eat, I wash my hands. I brush my teeth after / when I finish a meal. After / When I finish a meal, I brush my teeth.
I take a shower when I get up. When I get up, I take a shower. We have dinner as soon as he comes home from work. As soon as he comes home from work, we have dinner.
