Adverbial Clauses: Before, After, When, As soon As with the Present Tense

- **FORM:** These words can be used at the beginning or in the middle of the sentence and when used with Simple Present tense, introduce two habits that happen together.
- **USE: "Before"** introduces an action which <u>follows</u> another. "**After"** introduces an action which <u>precedes</u> another. "**When"** is the same as "after", but it can also be used to introduce an action or situation which happens as a habit with another habit. "**As soon as"** introduces an action or situation which is <u>immediately</u> followed by another one.
- EXAMPLES: I wash my hands <u>before</u> I eat. <u>Before</u> I eat, I wash my hands. I brush my teeth <u>after / when</u> I finish a meal. <u>After / When</u> I finish a meal, I brush my teeth. I take a shower <u>when</u> I get up. <u>When</u> I get up, I take a shower. We have dinner <u>as soon as</u> he comes home from work. <u>As soon as</u> he comes home from work, we have dinner.
