Indirect Speech: Yes/No Questions

FORM:

To make a yes/no question in **indirect speech**, from a yes/no question in **direct speech**, do the following:

- Take out the comma, quotation marks and question mark.
- Put the word "if" or "whether" between the verb or indirect object and the words being reported.
- Change the word order of the subject and verb in questions with "to be", "to have" and "will".
- Take out the auxiliary "do" if it is used in the direct speech question.
- Change the verb tense and time marker if necessary.
- Change the pronouns if necessary.

EXAMPLES:

Direct speech: *Elizabeth asked, "Do you want something to eat?"* **Indirect speech**: *Elizabeth asked if I wanted something to eat.*

Direct speech: George asked Fred, "Are you ready yet?" Indirect speech: George asked Fred if he was ready yet.
