## **Expressing Wants: Want + Someone to**

FORM:

want + to + base verb OR

want + noun or pronoun + to + base verb (someone)

**USE:** 

This structure is used to express what someone would like to do, and to

describe what someone would like someone else to do.

**NOTE:** It is not possible in English to say "want + that + noun + verb".

E.g. I want  $\underline{that}$  he leave. = NOT SAID

I want to leave  $OR\ I$  want  $\underline{him}$  to leave. = SAID

**EXAMPLES:** I'm hungry, I want to eat.

He's talking too much. I want him to be quiet.

I gave the report to Debbie. I want her to read it this afternoon.
