Present Perfect Continuous: Versus Past Continuous

FORM:	I <u>have been working</u> . I <u>was working</u> . She <u>has been driving</u> . She <u>was driving</u> .
USE:	The present perfect continuous is used when an action is not finished. The past continuous is used for actions that were in progress in the past, but are completed now.
EXAMPLES:	The students <u>have been writing</u> the test since 10 o'clock. (still writing the test) The students <u>were writing</u> the test at 10 o'clock. (the test is finished now) He <u>was writing</u> the test when I arrived. (the test is finished now)

- Edward <u>has been working / was working</u> on the report all morning. He has to finish it by tomorrow.
