FORM:	Noun	<u>Comparative</u>	<u>Superlative</u>
	money (non-count)	more money than less money than	the most money the least money
	friends (count)	more friends than fewer friends than	the most friends the fewest friends
USE:	For <i>non-count nouns</i> use MORE/LESS + NOUN + THAN for the comparative form and THE MOST/LEAST + NOUN for the superlative form. For <i>count nouns</i> use MORE/FEWER + PLURAL NOUN + THAN for the comparative form and THE MOST/FEWEST + PLURAL NOUN for the superlative form.		
EXAMPLES:	My mother earns <u>more money than</u> my sister. (money: non-count noun) My father earns <u>the most money</u> . My sister earns <u>less money than</u> my mother. My brother earns <u>the least money</u> . I have <u>fewer books than</u> Jack. (books: count noun) Peter has <u>the fewest books</u> .
