FORM: Adjectives
Positive: as + adjective + as
George is as tall as Rob.
Negative: not as + adjective + as
George is not as tall as Rob.
Adverbs $\quad$ Positive: main verb + as + adverb + as
Sandy drives as carefully as Joanne.
Negative: $n o t+$ main verb + as + adverb + as
Sandy does not drive as carefully as Joanne.
Verbs $\quad$ Positive: main verb + as much as
Carl cooks as much as Stan.
Negative: not + main verb + as much as
Carl does not cook as much as Stan. (verb)
Count Nouns Positive: main verb + as many + noun + as
The parents eat as many chocolate bars as their children do.
Negative: not + main verb + as many + noun + as
The parents do not eat as many chocolate bars as their children do.

Non-Count Positive: main verb + as much + noun + as
Nouns
The parents eat as much chocolate as their children do.
Negative: not + main verb + as much + noun + as
The parents do not eat as much chocolate as their children do.
