

## Comparatives and Superlatives: Positive and Negative Comparisons

<b>FORM:</b>	<b>Adjectives</b>	<u>Positive:</u> as + adjective + as <i>George is as tall as Rob.</i> <u>Negative:</u> not as + adjective + as <i>George is not as tall as Rob.</i>
	<b>Adverbs</b>	<u>Positive:</u> main verb + as + adverb + as <i>Sandy drives <u>as carefully as</u> Joanne.</i> <u>Negative:</u> not + main verb + as + adverb + as <i>Sandy does <u>not drive as carefully as</u> Joanne.</i>
	<b>Verbs</b>	<u>Positive:</u> main verb + as much as <i>Carl <u>cooks as much as</u> Stan.</i> <u>Negative:</u> not + main verb + as much as <i>Carl does <u>not cook as much as</u> Stan. (verb)</i>
	<b>Count Nouns</b>	<u>Positive:</u> main verb + as many + noun + as <i>The parents <u>eat as many chocolate bars as</u> their children do.</i> <u>Negative:</u> not + main verb + as many + noun + as <i>The parents do <u>not eat as many chocolate bars as</u> their children do.</i>
	<b>Non-Count Nouns</b>	<u>Positive:</u> main verb + as much + noun + as <i>The parents <u>eat as much chocolate as</u> their children do.</i> <u>Negative:</u> not + main verb + as much + noun + as <i>The parents do <u>not eat as much chocolate as</u> their children do.</i>
