It is used to show that something started in the past or was true in the past, and is continuing at the time you speak about it or is true now. "Still" shows that someone or something has NOT changed. | | | | | |
| | "Anymore" is used in <u>negative sentences</u> to show a change in a situation or activity. Something was true in the past but is not true now. "Anymore" is used at the end of sentences and clauses. | | | | | |
| EXAMPLES: | Is Marie <u>still</u> here? Yes, she's <u>still</u> here. (She was here before and is here now). No, she isn't here <u>anymore</u> . (She was here before and is NOT here now) | | | | | |
