Present Perfect: Adverbs of Frequency

FORM: Has / Have (not) + adverb of time + past participle

Always – (100%) all of the Sometimes / occasionally – (30%) some of the

time / now and then

Usually – (90%) habitually, **Rarely** – (10%) hardly ever, seldom, infrequently

normally

Often – (60%) frequently, **Never** – (0%) not ever

many times

USE: The adverb **ever** can only be used in questions to ask if someone has had a

particular experience. The other **time adverbs** dealt with here, give us an idea of how often a person has had an experience. In affirmative and negative sentences,

time adverbs are placed between has / have and the past participle.

EXAMPLES: *Have you ever seen a bear in the forest?*

No, I have never seen one.

She <u>has usually seen</u> one at the zoo.
