The Past Perfect: Overview		
FORM:	HAD + PAST PARTICIPLE	
USE:	Use the "past perfect" to demonstrate that one action or situation in the past happened or existed before another related past action or situation. Use the past perfect when you have two events in the past and it is important to know which action came first: the action is completed before a particular / specific time in the past.	
	E.g. "They <u>had</u> already <u>left</u> by the time we arrived" means that they were not there, when we arrived, we did not see them there.	
EXAMPLES:	We <u>went</u> back to Banff because we <u>had</u> always <u>enjoyed</u> our holidays there. Because I <u>had eaten</u> before the meeting, I courageously <u>resisted</u> the doughnuts.
