The Past Perfect: With Indirect Speech	
FORM:	Direct Speech: "I've seen that movie." Indirect Speech: Steven said that <u>he'd seen</u> that movie.
USE:	In indirect speech, the past perfect replaces the simple past or the present perfect from direct speech. Use the past perfect in indirect speech when the verb it is used with is clearly situated farther in the past than the verb used to describe the original speech (said, told, stated, claimed, asked, etc.). NOTE: In Indirect Speech statements use "that"; for "yes/ no" questions use "if".
EXAMPLES:	 Direct: "I <u>saw</u> her at the store yesterday." Indirect: She said that she <u>had seen</u> her at the store the day before. Direct: "I'<u>ve</u> never <u>had</u> Korean food before." Indirect: She said that she <u>had</u> never <u>had</u> Korean food before.
