Intensifiers: Overview

USE: Intensifiers tell us how much (amount or degree) of an adjective or an adverb

there is.

FORM: Common intensifiers, in order of degree are:

Degree Intensifier Example Sentence

More than needed too She is too busy. She doesn't get any

rest.

<u>A large degree</u> very, extremely, really, so She is very busy.

<u>A moderate degree</u> *quite, fairly She is quite busy.*

A small degree a little, slightly, a bit She is a little busy.

<u>Less than needed</u> not enough She is not busy enough. She is bored.

All intensifiers, except **enough**, go before the adjective or adverb they are intensifying. **Enough** goes after the adjective or adverb.

She is **extremely** good at skiing.

He is not good **enough** at skiing to go on the difficult hills.

In a noun phrase, intensifiers go between the determiner and the adjective they are intensifying. **Quite** is an exception. It goes before the determiner.

She is an <u>extremely</u> good skier.

She is quite a good skier.
