Intensifiers: With *Not*

USE:

When you put **NOT** in front of an intensifier, it makes the meaning the opposite. Only a few intensifiers can be used with **NOT**.

All of the sentences below mean that the temperature is moderate, even though the sentences all have the word "hot" in them.

It is not too hot.
It is not very hot.
It is not so hot.
It is not really hot.
It is not a bit hot.

You can not use **NOT** with these intensifiers.

extremely fairly

We use **NOT** to make a statement less strong, more indirect and more polite.

The book is boring. (too strong) The book is <u>not too</u> interesting. (less strong)

She is short. (impolite) She is <u>not too</u> tall. (more polite)

This food is horrible. (direct) This food is <u>not too</u> good. (indirect)
