FORM:

MAKE DO

- irregular verbs
- conjugated according to the normal rules for verbs

USE:

It is hard to choose between these two verbs.

In general, "DO" is to perform, and "MAKE" is to create or to construct.

Example: The teacher <u>makes</u> up the exam and the student <u>does</u> it. Below are lists of words (or phrases) that follow "MAKE" or "DO".

Note: When you are not sure, use "make" because the odds are in your favour that it

will be correct!
